Meeting of the Waterbury Select Board Monday, June 19, 2023 Steele Community Room, 28 North Main Street

The meeting was called to order by R. Clapp at 7:00pm

Approve Agenda: K. Sweeney made a motion to approve the agenda. A. Johnson seconded the motion, a vote was held and passed unanimously.

Consent Agenda: K. Sweeney made motion to approve the consent agenda. A. Johnson seconded the motion, a vote was held and passed unanimously.

Public: R. Clapp opened the public section of the meeting by acknowledging today is Juneteenth. Secondly recognized the volunteers from Downstreet Housing that came into Waterbury to assist with Recreation projects. Lastly R. Clapp recognized contributions to Waterbury made by S. Lotspeich over the years.

Tree Committee Appointment – Nita Hultstrom & Zinn Wolfe: E. Fuller and S. Lotspeich have resigned from Tree Committee and left two unexpired seats in their absence.

- N. Hultstrom spoke of her interest and background relating to an opportunity to be appointed to one of the vacant seats on the Committee.
- D. Kehlmann made a motion to appoint N. Hultstrom to the two-year term ending 2025 and Z. Wolfe for the one-year term ending 2024 on the Tree Committee. A. Johnson seconded the motion. A vote was held and passed unanimously.

CVRPC & Transportation Committee Appointments: S. Lotspeich spoke to the appointments, responsibilities and what it means to be the alternate. All are one-year positions that expire each year on July 1st.

D. Gleason feels he is best suited for the Regional Planning Commission but was not aware of the Transportation position until this evening. A. Johnson moved to appoint D. Gleason as the Waterbury representative to the CVRPC beginning July 1, 2023. K. Sweeney seconded. A vote was held and passed unanimously.

*Tree Care Ordinance: S. Whitney and S. Lotspeich briefed the Board on the development of the Tree Care Ordinance. Common goal was to unify the language between communities in Vermont. Vermont Urban and Community Forestry Program uses the language "Tree Board" opposed to Tree Committee. The Tree Committee does not have a lot of statutory authority,

that falls on the Tree Warden. Discussion followed regarding how this Ordinance may be affected by other Town Ordinances such as Zoning ie: how does a property owner on Main Street know of the tree they want to plant is in the ROW. There is a typo on page 3; Penalties for such... "may be fined". (this has been updated on published DRAFT). Suggestion to have Select Board review the Ordinance and come back to the Tree Committee with comments and warn the Ordinance for public comment. A. Johnson thanked everyone for their hard work on the Tree Care Ordinance and moved to add the Tree Care Ordinance to the July 17th meeting. Advise the public and relevant Boards and Committees to notify T. Leitz with any comments in advance of the 7/17/2023 meeting. K. Sweeney seconded the motion. A vote was held and passed 3-2 with D. Kehlmann & M. Bard abstaining because they were not able to hear most of the conversation.

Planning Director & Acting Zoning Administrator appointment: The Planning Commission has made a recommendation of a candidate to fill the Planning Director vacancy position. Previously there was a Director of Planning & Zoning and a Zoning Administrator, both had the authority to issue zoning permits. This authority is retained however the new Planning Director will not have oversight of the Zoning Administrator; this individual will report directly to the Town Manager once hired. The Planning Director will be the Acting Zoning Administrator when/if the ZA is not able to issue permits such as illness or vacation. A. Johnson made a motion to appoint Neal Leitner as the Planning Director and acting Zoning Administrator concurrent with the Planning Commission's recommendation. K. Sweeney seconded. A vote was held and passed unanimously.

R. Adler joined the meeting via Zoom — the Board Revisited the agenda item to appoint an individual to the CVRPC Board. R. Adler declined the options available as Alternate CVRPC rep and Transportation Committee member.

*Entertainment Ordinance: T. Leitz and D. Kehlmann met previously and reviewed many of the Ordinances. Most of the language in this Ordinance is embedded in State Law. A parade is not a show as defined by the State. Pages 2 & 3 approval conditions – the option to add an approval condition that the Entertainment Ordinance follow the Parade Policy. There are minor adjustments but this Ordinance is consistence with the law. T. Leitz with the assistance of Chief G. Dillon has drafted a Parade Policy for the Boards consideration. R. Clapp would like to see a "parade" defined with a Street Closure. Proposal to create a Parade Policy and Permit opposed to altering the Entertainment Permit. Will the Rotary need to apply for a permit to organize NQID? This is a Town event that happens to be organized by the Rotary. T. Leitz suggested an MOU. Rotary member D. McKibben would prefer a permit opposed to an MOU to streamline the process.

*Recreation Facilities Ordinance: This Ordinance is not about use but behavior at the parks. Page 1 section G referred to a public indecency ordinance which staff cannot locate at this time. Camping is an unpermitted use at our park facilities. K. Sweeney feels Section 3 should be reviewed.

**Recreation Department Parks Facilities Policy: This policy exists on the Recreation website; document was created in 2019 T. Leitz was not able to find a reference of this policy in the Select Board or Recreation Committee meeting minutes. Suggestion at this time would be to correct the misspelled word, have the Recreation Committee review it and propose adoption of this policy by the Select Board.

*Fields and Facilities Reservation Policies: This policy has been adopted and is far less detailed then the unadopted policy above. T. Leitz believes these two policies should be reviewed and mingled to make one. Board consensus is to have the Recreation Committee review both policies and make a recommendation.

Board would like to see a Special Events Policy that umbrellas "Vendor" – "Parade" – "Entertainment."

Agenda items moved to accommodate K. Haviland

Resolution to Apply for Sales Tax Reallocation for 51 South Main Street: This is a grant application for Downstreet to receive a tax benefit for sales tax paid on the project at 51 South Main Street. The sales tax paid on the first \$100,000 spent will stay with the State of Vermont. The remaining sales tax will be returned to be applied to project costs. A. Johnson stated this option is available to Downstreet due to the Downtown Designation. A. Johnson moved to approve the 2023 Sales Tax Reallocation Application on behalf of Downstreet Housing. K. Sweeney seconded the motion, a vote was held and passed unanimously.

2024 ARPA spending processes - review survey results: K. Sweeney found an auction of restaurant equipment which he shared with R. Clapp as well as the Senior Center and considers this a possible way to upgrade equipment while realizing cost savings. M. Bard suggests perhaps the Select Board consider an "up to" amount to give the Senior Center to be used at an equipment auction. M. Bard was able to give insight about the Alley project specific to the cost of the benches as mentioned in the previous meeting. 2024 construction of the alleyway is anticipated but they are only at 50% funds raised and cannot move forward until they raise the remaining 50% of the needed money. Discussion followed regarding in-kind donation of labor to prep the alleyway opposed to a cash contribution to the project. T. Leitz was asked to investigate this option and see what the Highway Department can contribute. M. Bard warned it is private property so he has concerns about the Town providing staff time to this project. T. Leitz stated there is an MOU which provides for public access. A. Johnson wonders if the Board has an interest in creating an application process for organizations to apply for ARPA funding and if so, what is the timeline for such an outreach. K. Sweeney previously asked about the Town's debt ceiling for ARPA funding allocations. T. Leitz could prepare a resolution for spending ARPA funds and gain time for community outreach. T. Leitz mentioned several other worthy causes such as the Waterbury Pool, Arts in the community and handicap accessibility upgrades in the parks. There is approximately \$300,000 plus the possibility of \$200,000 from reappraisal money. The only outstanding commitment is to the Senior Center in the amount of \$60,000. Leaving roughly \$440,000 in available ARPA funds.

Next Meeting Agenda – July 17, 2023: Agenda needs to have Tree Ordinance added and Recreation & Infrastructure costs re: ARPA funds investment placed in the Parking Lot. SE Group will take up a considerable amount of time with public comment anticipated. Move the Auditor Presentation to August 7, 2023. Place Capital Improvement Fund in the parking lot. Add Deputy Tree Warden to the parking lot. Add Zoning Compliance and Occupancy Permits to the parking lot.

Adjourn: K. Sweeney made a motion to adjourn. A. Johnson seconded the motion, a vote was held and passed unanimously at 9:48pm

The Board of Commissioners is composed of one representative from each of the Commission's 23 member municipalities. The municipality's locally elected legislative body (Selectboard or City Council) may appoint a Commissioner and an Alternate Commissioner, who votes in the Commissioner's absence. CVRPC requires annual certification of the appointment.

Alternate Commissioners provide a voice for the municipality when the appointed Commissioner is unable to participate in meetings.

Commissioners have three main roles: policy setting, stewardship, and advocacy. An example of these roles is outlined below:

- Oversee the vision and mission of the organization and keep it relevant to the needs of the region.

Town of Waterbury Parade Policy

Parade organizers must provide a safety plan to the Municipal Manager and Emergency Management Director that meets their satisfaction and approval. At a minimum the plan shall include the following minimum criteria:

- The specific dates and times for road closures.
- A plan to ensure safe traffic control, utilizing volunteers, featuring some of all of the following:
 - The ability to post adults, with safety vests, at every impacted intersection.
 - Specific instructions for adults posted at intersections in regards to alternative routes for impacted drivers.
- A plan to ensure fire, ambulance and other emergency vehicles can respond to public safety emergencies without undue delay.
- Any specific request to utilize emergency service vehicles to lead or trail the parade.
- An estimated number of participants and attendees, to the extent possible, based on any prior history or other data.
- Specific plans to improve any issues or challenges that may have arisen in prior years.

Once reviewed and approved by the Municipal Manager and Emergency Management Director the plan will be provided to the selectboard as background information related to the request to close the road.

SECTION 3: PROJECT SCOPE/TIMELINE

Describe the scope of the qualified development project. What work will be completed? What will the building be used for? If applicable, identify project phases.

Downstreet Housing and Community Development (Downstreet) and Evernorth, as co-General Partners, are proposing the development of 26 new affordable rental units at 51 South Main Street in the Designated Downtown of Waterbury.

The units will be located in a vibrant, walkable downtown. They will provide perpetually affordable, energy-efficient, mixed-income, workforce housing that will meet the needs of lower-income residents of Waterbury, those who commute to Waterbury for work, and the employment needs of local businesses. They will be housed in a single, 3-story building constructed on .8 acres of land that is currently an underutilized parking lot. The new building will be designed to Efficiency Vermont's High Energy Tract Standard. It will include tenant storage, interior and exterior common space and other amenities. The(4) Studios, (17) 1-bedrooms and (5) 2-bedroom units will be affordable for individuals and families making 30% AMI to 80% AMI.

The workforce and affordable housing goals of the project are inclusive and extend to people with intellectual or developmental disabilities and people exiting homelessness. A variety of Resident Services will assist all of our tenants and enhance the project's impact. We are extending beyond our own resident services program and are partnering with Good Samaritan Haven, Upper Valley Services and HireAbility to ensure we meet all our tenants needs

The value of 26 new units in the Waterbury community cannot be overstated. While the overall need is estimated to be much higher, the project at 51. South Main St. would decrease the housing deficit in Waterbury, starting by offering greater housing options to the community's most vulnerable populations, while simultaneously creating affordable housing opportunities for a local workforce that is struggling to find options.

Describe the scope of the municipal project. How will this project support the qualified development project?

The municipality of Waterbury will play a support role in this project. The Edward Farrar Utility District (EFUD) currently owns the parcel of land at 51 South Main Street. The EFUD Board chose to allow its members to decide whether to sell the lot to Downstreet for the purpose of affordable rental housing. Through a series of public meetings and discussions, the community came together in an overwhelming demonstration of support of more housing. In October 2022, over 75% of the 277 in-person voters chose to say yes to affordable housing, giving Downstreet an Option Agreement on the site. Moving forward, the Town of Waterbury will work with Downstreet to administer funding from VCDP and assist us as we work through local permitting. Additionally, the Town of Waterbury recently received a Bylaw Modernization Grant to revise the Zoning and Bylaws. The Planning Commission hopes this process will create greater density and spur infill in the Designated Downtown. This project could serve as a positive example of what greater density can look like without compromising the character of Downtown.

B. Partners

Downstreet and Evernorth are co-general partners in the development of this project. Recognizing quality affordable housing goes beyond bricks and mortar, we will partner with several local service organizations to provided assistance for our residents. Three of the 26 apartments are set aside for people with intellectual or developmental disabilities. Upper Valley Services (UVS) will provide services to these tenants. The services will be responsive to the unique needs of individual residents and will include: overnight staff located in an on-site office, transportation, training, medication administration, budgeting, and meal planning and preparation. Five of the 26 housing units will be set aside for people exiting homelessness. Good Samaritan Haven (GSH) will provide intensive case management services for these tenants that includes services planning, life skills support, budgeting, crisis intervention, resource and service coordination, and other interventions as needed.

We will also partner with HireAbility to provide their full range of employment services to all our tenants including on-site information sessions, counseling, job coaching, resume development, mock interviews, help with assistive technology, and more.

C. Funding Gap

Downstreet and Evernorth have secured \$3,600,000 in funding for this project, \$3.5million from Vermont Housing and Conservation Board and \$100,000 in Town ARPA dollars from the Town of Waterbury. We have applied to receive 9% tax credits from VHFA, Community Recovery and Revitalization Program Funds, and have also applied for \$500,000 in funding from Vermont Community Development Program. Due to the competitive process and the timeline for our project at the time, our proposals were bumped to the next funding rounds. We will apply for funds from Efficiency Vermont, Town of Waterbury UDAG dollars, Affordable Housing Program funding, and Local Investment Advisory Committee funds. The remaining funding sources with their corresponding amounts can be found on the attached Project Budget. Downstreet and Evernorth applied to VHCB for \$5.1million but were only awarded \$3.5million, this has created a \$1.6million gap. This tax credit award, along with some of the additional sources mentioned above will hopefully fill this gap for this project.

Downstreet and Evernorth have worked through Feasibility and Schematic Design for the site and building with Gossens Bachman Architects. The Architects delivered a pricing set and outline specifications in January of 2023. The documents were used by Barden Inspection and Consulting to create a construction cost.

The need for more affordable housing options is felt acutely by the citizens of Waterbury. A low inventory of rental units and homeownership opportunities combined with rising costs and limited buildable area have yielded a lack of options for the community. Thus, the citizens, business community and Town officials have demonstrated strong support for the creation of new housing within the downtown. This Project meets the housing needs identified in Revitalizing Waterbury's 2022 Housing Study, which recommends the high-density development of primarily studio, one and two-bedroom units. It assists with affordable housing needs in a community with a high growth rate. A fall 2022 housing needs assessment commissioned by Downstreet indicates an overall population growth rate double that of the state with the 20-29-year old age cohort increasing by 17% and 30-39-year old's increasing by 7%. Downstreet's market study highlighted the high percentage of 1-2 person households currently in Waterbury and showed that the majority of the population falls within the AMI levels offered in this building. Approximately 36% of Waterbury renters earn less than 60% AMI, and over half of renters earn less than 80% AMI. The study indicates that the rental vacancy rate in Waterbury is less than 1.5%. Downstreet currently operates 3 affordable rental buildings in Waterbury where there is a near-zero vacancy rate.

The new rental apartments will be located in an active, walkable Designated Downtown. They will provide perpetually affordable, energy-efficient, mixed-income, housing for the local workforce. Anecdotally, business owners are struggling to find employees and have come out in strong support of the project. These units will meet the affordable housing needs of the workforce, lower-income residents of Waterbury, lower-income people who commute to Waterbury for work, and assist the employment needs of local businesses.

Washington County has a rising demand for affordable housing which incorporates services targeted towards those with developmental disabilities, and those experiencing homelessness. Our Service provider, Upper Valley Services highlights the extremely limited supply of supportive housing for the over 12,000 individuals with intellectual or development disabilities in the State of Vermont. They have stated that they currently have at least 25 individuals in central Vermont who would benefit from this type of housing.

With the end of the state's General Assistance Hotel Voucher Program, the need for more housing for those exiting homelessness couldn't be more urgent. The inclusion of 5 units, managed by Good Samaritan haven will help meet that need.

The urgent need for affordable rental housing in Waterbury has been clearly demonstrated by the data presented in the 2023 market study, anecdotal evidence and grassroots organizing by residents, support from local businesses, and requests for assistance by the Town. The creation of 26 affordable apartments at 51 South Main Street is not enough to meet the current need, but it is a clear step toward improving housing options for the town.
