Our Central Vermont Career Center (CVCC) communities on behalf of the Central Vermont Career Center School District Board. We are delighted to report that our students continue to excel across all of our programs as they develop the skills they need to embark on successful careers.

At CVCC, we are training students to become the next generation of mechanics, graphic designers, chefs, plumbers, contractors, hair stylists, EMTs, nurses, and much more. These are high-demand, well-paying careers. Just as important, we are giving them the opportunity to find those rewarding careers right here in Vermont. Many go on to earn college or graduate degrees before returning to the communities that raised them, while others enter their chosen careers directly. Regardless of the paths they choose, CVCC students see the real possibilities beyond what they're learning. Each day they acquire new skills that bring them closer to the career or degree programs they can't wait to embark on. Many of our programs incorporate a nationally-recognized certification program, providing our students the ability to earn advanced credentials, positioning them for even greater success in their chosen fields.

Finally, the CVCCSD board is committed to increasing community involvement in all aspects of the school. We are working on an engagement plan to include all parents, industry partners and community members for the purpose of collaboration and to build a strong, supportive sense of community. We encourage all interested parties to get involved whenever possible through committee work, open houses and regular board meetings.

Message From the Director

I continue to be incredibly grateful to be a member of the Central Vermont Career Center. Every day I have the privilege of walking into programs and seeing students engaged and excited about their learning. I have truly not had a more rewarding experience than these three years at CVCC!

This year we are excited to have our Building Trades, Electrical, and Plumbing & Heating programs collaborating to work with the State of Vermont to renovate a mobile home, and to work with Habitat for Humanity to begin building a new home locally. In addition, we separated our Emergency Services programs into two separate programs; EMS 2 continues to be taught in collaboration with Vermont State University's (VTSU) paramedic program. We continue to have one program, Design & Fabrication, located off site at the Vermont Granite Museum. We also extended our collaboration with Vermont Heating and Ventilation (VHV) allowing our Plumbing program to continue to move forward.

We kicked off the school year at CVCC on August 30th with 208 students in 14 programs and Coop after our final round of acceptances on August 24th. In addition, we are working with the Institute for Liberatory Innovation and have an Equity Scholar in Residence supporting staff and students here at CVCC, an outcome of the last round of Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment and our Curriculum and Instruction Review (CIR) Results last year.

CVCC staff teams have set and been working diligently on the following goals:

- CVCC Career Pathways Team Goal: To celebrate the success of CVCC graduates by continually spotlighting alumni publicly at CVCC, as well as analyze data from advisory board meetings and provide recommendations regarding the format of future meetings.
- CVCC Instruction Team Goal: To develop Professional Development that
 focused on creating robust opportunities for Literacy and Math Skills by
 supporting educators learning. This focus of the teams learning and provided
 Professional Development was by developing a workshop that focused on
 Higher Order Thinking, Bloom's Taxonomy, and Socratic Dialogue.
- CVCC Student Leadership Team Goal: (1) Strengthen leadership team
 and create a structure for communication out from student leadership to
 all students to provide opportunities for feedback. (2) Support Student
 Leadership in goals and work. (3) Continue to explore ways to enhance and
 encourage student voice.

As we continue to see increased student interest in our programming, we continue to look at ways to grow our center with the goal of building toward a new, stand alone career center by 2029. We are collaborating with the Vermont State College system and local businesses in the hopes of strengthening pathways for students, thus increasing the workforce. 

Automotive Technology

Shift your career into 5th gear with Automotive Technology! Whether you love trucks, cars, ATVs, or snow machines, it all starts with understanding the automotive service industry. Get direct experience with the latest industry technology and tools. Dive into steering and suspension, brake systems,



electronics, and engine performance. Learn proper repair and maintenance procedures to service automobiles and light trucks—a green light to success!

Baking & Culinary Arts

The folding of a croissant, the lattice work of a pie—your hands will transform sugar, butter, and flour into awe-inspiring creations in Baking Arts. From sourcing ingredients to artistically presenting them on a plate, Culinary Arts will teach you classical recipes, methods, and techniques, as



well as new trends in food preparation. In lecture and lab, learn foundational principles, methods/preparations, plus customer service skills, culinary math, and workplace skills. As you get an overview of different parts of the hospitality industry, you'll learn about their distinguishing characteristics and trends. Graduate on track for success with up to five college credits and a solid foundation under your apron!

Building Trades

Do you wonder how structures are made? In Building Trades, you'll learn residential and commercial skills from the ground up while earning the NCCER credentials. Along the way, you'll learn the principles and skills of general carpentry. A real foundation for your future career!



Cosmetology I & II

Cosmetology allows you to put your artistic skills to work in an industry that helps people look and feel their best. While you learn all you need to complete this two-year program successfully, it prepares you for the Vermont State Board of Cosmetology license exam. You will also learn all of the other career pathways that this industry



can offer. In your second year, you will also have an opportunity to run your own class salon offering hair cutting and coloring, chemical texturizing, waxing, skincare, nail services, and makeup application in the CVCC salon.

Design & Fabrication

CVCC, in partnership with the Vermont Granite Museum, has established a unique program introducing students to the traditional methods of stone sculpting and contemporary methods in design and fabrication. While studying at the Vermont Granite Museum, students create using various materials in both 2D



and 3D forms. Designs are generated by hand and with computer software, including 3D scanning and printing technologies, casting, molding, and carving a variety of materials types. Students are introduced to the lettering, design, and fabrication of memorial and monumental art and introduced to advanced manufacturing methods including CNC and CAD/CAM processes.

Digital Media Arts I & II

These programs are the home of creativity and collaborative project-based learning. Enhance your vision of the world in our photography unit where you can master cameras and manipulation software. Learn new ways of communicating and work with community partners during our graphic design unit. Or bring your movie ideas to life in DMA II during our filmmaking unit where you gain access to

advanced industry-standard camera equipment and learn to master editing software.
Through photography, graphics, film, music, web design, and animation our students master creativity for the entire world of media possibilities.



Electrical Technology

Imagine having the skills to wire a house, bringing power to it for the first time! In the Electrical Technology program,

you'll learn everything you need to prepare for a career as an electrician, including a registered apprenticeship: install, connect, test, and maintain electrical systems. Learn residential and commercial skills and earn NCCER credentials — power your future!



Emergency Services I

Would you know what to do in an emergency? Our program prepares you to handle many types of emergencies and become fully prepared to enter the Emergency Services workforce as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) or enter post-secondary education and training. The program prepares you to earn your National Registry of EMTs (NREMT) certification, recognized across the country.

Emergency Services II

This second-year option introduces the theory and application of concepts related to the Paramedic level of the EMS profession. This is the only second year program in Vermont and the only one in the United States that high



school seniors are doing paramedic level EMS education. The focus is to provide basic and advanced emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system. Skills include extending the knowledge of the EMT to a more complex breadth and depth, intravenous access and fluid therapy, medication administration, blind insertion airway devices, and the advanced assessment and management of various medical illnesses and traumatic injuries and follows the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA's) Emergency Medical Services Education Standards. The program is done as a collaboration with Vermont State University and earns students 33 credits towards an associate's degree. Once the students complete the full course they are eligible to take the National Registry of EMTs Paramedic certification exam

Exploratory Technology


Our Exploratory Technology program is just that: a wonderful way to gain foundational skills and explore career pathways and the many opportunities available in this 9th- and 10th-grade educational experience. You'll balance your time



honing your academic skills and shadowing each of the Career Center's programs, really giving you an up-close look at what the classes and instructors are like. While you're at it, you'll develop critical thinking, reasoning, and problem-solving skills, and personal finance—skills that you can use for the rest of your life!

Medical Professions

Health care jobs are predicted to be the largest and fastest growing career sector. In this program you'll learn human biology, the science of nutrition, basic clinical assessment skills, vital signs, blood glucose monitoring, medical terminology, phlebotomy, professionalism skills, first aid and CPR, electronic health record training and



also explore a variety of the medical professions through job shadowing—what they are, what they do, and what training they require.

Plumbing & Heating

Want a career that's really heating up? The Plumbing & Heating program prepares you for entry-level jobs, including a registered apprenticeship, by helping you gain basic knowledge of plumbing and hydronic heating systems, as well as earning NCCER credentials. The job opportunity outlook for both fields is strong, meaning graduates of this program are in high demand.

School Climate Student Survey / January 2024



CVCC 6-Month Student Graduation Follow Up

Each year, CVCC attempts to determine the career status of our program participants who graduated from high school six months earlier. Based on that information, we calculate the percentage of respondents who are engaged in some type of post-secondary (i.e., after high school) education, are employed, are in the military, or are unemployed.

The following chart reflects the results for the class of 2023.

Cooperative Education Program

The Cooperative Education Program (Co-op) is a 2nd year option for students, who have completed a program at CVCC. Co-op extends academic and technical training beyond the classroom by providing opportunities for students to apply their learning in a workplace setting. Students will be immersed in Work-Based Learning opportunities up to four days a week and attend sessions at CVCC one day a week.

The Co-op program is a collaboration between the Central Vermont Career Center and area employers and is designed to offer paid or unpaid career-related experiences that build on and expand a student's skills. Whether the goal is to develop self-confidence, employability skills or advanced job placement, the Cooperative Education career-based curriculum encourages students to put their education to work.

Students in the Plumbing & Heating program and Electrical Technology program can be a part of the Vermont Registered Apprenticeship program and take the level 2 apprenticeship test.

Career Work Experience (CWE) is a career exploration experience in an occupational field related to students' academic and career goals. Students spend short periods of time in a particular job or industry. These unpaid placements allow for career exploration and provide in-depth knowledge of the day-to-day activities and skills needed to perform a job successfully.

Adult Education Program 2023

The Central Vermont Career Center Adult Education program works to increase the skill level and employability of community members through earning industry-recognized credentials and certifications.

The Adult Education program continues to offer multiple sessions of the License Nursing Assistant (LNA) class throughout the 2022-2023 school year, with 16 students enrolled throughout the year, a collaboration with CVMC resulted in three students taking a Phlebotomy class and receiving their NHA certification, and a collaboration with Vermont Works for Women resulted in eight adults earning their OSHA 10 Certification and increasing their skills working with hand and power tools. We also have CPR and/or First Aid classes available for the community to earn American Heart Association certificates. Other programming is currently being explored as well.

We continue to work with area partners to identify other employment and training needs in the community. To continue to expand high quality training and certification programs we also welcome input from the community. Any thoughts or suggestions should be directed to: ccook@cvtcc.org.

Dual Enrollment and Fast Forward College Credits and Industry-Recognized Credentials (IRCs)

Through the Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward program students can get credit for college courses they pass while attending certain programs at CVCC.

Fast Forward is for Vermont students attending a Technical Center who have not yet graduated from high school and who are enrolled in a partner technical center program. Running Start is New Hampshire's version of the Vermont Fast Forward option for college credit providing students attending a Technical Center who have not yet graduated from high school and who are enrolled in a partner technical center program. The courses are taught at the Technical Center, and classes are scheduled during the regular school day so there is no disruption to their high school routine. When not earning College Credits, students may be earning Industry Recognized Credentials.

At the Central Vermont Career Center in 2022-2023, the following Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward courses and Industry-Recognized Credentials were offered:

For 2022-2023 our EMS Level 2 students will be enrolled in EMS 1111 Principles & Practices of Paramedicine I, and EMS 1121 Principles & Practices of Paramedicine II, and EMS 1131 Principles & Practices of Paramedicine III.

 12 college credits were earned for EMS 1111 and EMS 1121 and 9 college credits for EMS 1131 to each student.

Tier 2 IRCs: EMT-B, will be adding paramedic licensure.

Medical Professions:

For 2021-2022 students had the opportunity to take 6 Fast Forward Credits; Introduction to Healthcare (AHS-1045) and Human Biology (BIO-1140) through CCV.

A total of 36 college credits were earned.

For 2022-2023 students had the opportunity to take 6 Fast Forward Credits; Introduction to Healthcare (AHS-1045) and Human Biology (BIO-1140) through CCV. Students also had the opportunity to take Introduction to Psychology as an additional Fast Forward course through CCV. Five students earned 9 college credits each and 5 students earned 6 credits each.

⇒ Ten students earned a total of 75 college credits.


