If you vote by mail, we recommend mailing your ballot two weeks ahead of Election Day!

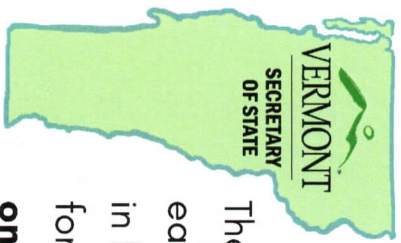


Primary Election Day!

Different ways to vote early:

- Request a ballot to be mailed to you, then:
 - Mail it back to your clerk
 - Hand-deliver it to your clerk
 - Put it in an official drop box
- In person at your clerk's office





VERMONT STATEWIDE PRIMARY

AUGUST 11, 2026

The Primary Election will decide which candidates each political party sends to the **General Election** in November. In Vermont, voters are offered ballots for **all three** major parties, and you must **choose one** to vote.

Want to vote early?



Be sure your ballot is counted! Request your ballot ASAP to ensure that you have time to vote and return your ballot by 7pm on Election Day.

You can request a ballot to be mailed to you by visiting the

Vermont Voter Portal (vote.vermont.gov) or by

contacting your town clerk's office.

You can vote in this primary!



When you return your ballot, leave plenty of time for mail delivery. You can always **hand-deliver** your ballot to the town clerk's office during their business hours or leave it in their secure drop box at any time.

After you return your ballot, you can track it on the

Vermont Voter Portal!

You can also vote early, in-person, at your clerk's office starting June 29! Just show up and vote – no need to wait for the mail!

Want to vote in person on August 11?



Check the **Vermont Voter Portal** to make sure you are registered and your address is up to date (and find your polling place!).

You can always register to vote in person at the polls on Election Day. Bring your ID with you to ensure a quick registration.

If you requested an early/absentee ballot but decide to vote in person, bring your ballot with you on Election Day.

Vermont has **Accessible Voting**

Machines available at every polling place! Voters with disabilities can vote privately and independently using this tablet-based system.
